In the backpacking world, there's a phrase known as "type 2 fun." It describes the kind of adventure that doesn't always feel fun while you're in it—when your pack is heavy, the trail is steep, the ticks are relentless, and you question why you ever started. But once it's over, those tough moments blur, and what remains is a deep sense of satisfaction, accomplishment, and greater strength. Afterwards you recall the mountain vistas, the unexpected warbler encounter, or the kind stranger who gave you a lift to town, all reminders of why the journey was worth it.

Confluence's first year of operations felt a lot like "type 2 conservation." Our staff and board are not drawn to the easy path; we embraced the challenges because they are leading to results. We are focused on the unglamorous but essential work of keeping protected areas protected, strengthening organizations, and answering the clear call from our partners for capacity building that makes conservation better. These solutions may not always be prioritized by mainstream funding, but they are the ones that build lasting success.

In 2024 I travelled to Bolivia and Argentina to lay the groundwork with local partners for a new regional resilient protegted areas conservation initiative. Alongside this, we developed tailored fiscal sponsorship services to help Bolivian NGOs raise and manage unrestricted funds during a period of intense economic volatility, ensuring their programs can endure and grow.

These early milestones are just the beginning. The momentum we're building reflects the trust our partners are placing in Confluence to "help people help nature". And just like type 2 fun on the trail, it's not only about the climb itself but also about the people we meet along the way. We are deeply grateful for the "trail magic" from many collaborators who have shared their time, expertise, and resources to make the Confluence journey possible. Looking ahead, we are energized by what's to come—more collaborations, more solutions, and more fun, even if some of it is still the type 2 variety.

Thank you for being part of this journey. The road is steep, but the vistas ahead are breathtaking. We invite you to continue trekking with us, supporting Confluence as we strengthen conservation across Latin America.

6. Traditional Collaboration Models

Inspired by the community collaborative traditions of Ecuadorian mingas and Mexican tequios, we catalyze a conservation culture in which non-profit partners collaborate, cross-pollinate ideas, and share resources, knowing that together we can achieve far more than alone.

Our Programs



We Built A Better Nonprofit!

In our first fiscal year, Confluence moved from startup to action. We secured 501(c)(3) status, established Human Resources and financial systems, built a transparent board, defined our mission, and approved our first long-range plan. By year's end, we were not only in the black but had five months of operating reserves. Just as importantly, we provided grant funding to three partners and piloted fiscal sponsorship frameworks in Bolivia, giving NGOs like Armonía access to international funding and financial tools otherwise unavailable. These unglamorous but essential steps ensure Confluence's growth is orderly, compliant, and scalable, while also strengthening our partners' financial sustainability.

We began by listening. We asked our partners what was slowing them down, where resources were scarce, and how fresh ideas could help them move forward. Those conversations shaped our programmatic approach.

Today, Confluence works through two complementary programs. **Conservation Capacity Building** equips local organizations with the tools, systems, and training they need to thrive. **Resilient Protected Areas & Watersheds** safeguards and restores ecosystems that are too important to lose, ensuring protected areas and watersheds have the resources for long-term management. Together these programs channel support where it is most needed, helping organizations and ecosystems across Latin America build durable and lasting conservation solutions.



Our partners across the region told us their greatest needs are stronger fundraising and communications. These two elements are inseparable, yet most Latin American nonprofits lack the staff and support to invest in these essentials.

Confluence stepped in not only with coaching and tools but by rolling up our sleeves to help partners get the work done. This year we provided grant funding to three Bolivian partners while also helping them strengthen their fundraising, communications, and financial systems. We co-wrote proposals and budgets, identified new funding prospects, and worked alongside staff to restructure operations. In Bolivia, we hosted two executive directors in Washington, DC for donor visits and strategic planning sessions and piloted fiscal sponsorship frameworks that opened access to international funding. In Argentina, we began working with a local leader to establish a new nonprofit to expand private protected area conservation in the Yungas. Across the region, we launched a monthly communications roundtable and provided one-on-one coaching in media strategy, website design, and annual reporting—already transforming how four NGOs share their stories and inspire donors.

Latin American nonprofit capacity building will remain a major focus in the years ahead. By ensuring that our partners are stronger, we ensure that the ecosystems they defend are too.



Protecting What's Too Important To Lose: Resilient Protected Areas And Watersheds Program

Our goal is bold but necessary: to make underserved protected areas and watersheds resilient across Latin America. For too long, conservation has celebrated the creation of new reserves while neglecting the harder work of long-term management. Confluence is redirecting the focus to what matters most: investing in steady stewardship, securing new funding streams, and strengthening the organizations and communities that keep these essential ecosystems intact.

In 2024 we selected our first priority ecosystems in the Central Andes and the Chocó. Together with partners, we laid the groundwork for a new regional initiative called Forever Yungas to improve long-term protection, management, and restoration of more than 20 protected areas in urgent need of support. At the same time, we joined the Save the Chocó initiative to bring new resources to one of the world's most threatened ecosystems.



The true added value of Confluence is not just capacity building but helping partners secure the resources they need to protect ecosystems that are too important to lose.

In our first year, Confluence focused on building a strong foundation. 




